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## Former area resident earns Sullivan Brothers Award

Four Mason City Police officers and three Mason City firefighters will receive the Sullivan Brothers Award of Valor from Governor Terry Branstad at a November ceremony in at the State Capitol. The presentation will begin at 11:30 a.m. on Monday, November 7<sup>th</sup> at the East Rotunda of the Capitol.

Officers Charlie Conner, Tiffany Creekmur, Ed Walthal and Lane Siefken along with firefighters Aaron Beemer, Peter Bieberl and Lt. David Orr are being

honored for their "life-savings actions" when a car carrying three Mason City high school students plunged into the Winnebago River in October 2010.

This is the highest honor which the state of Iowa can bestow on a peace officer or firefighter, according to Police Chief Michael Lashbrook.

The driver of the car, Dustin McMurray and passenger Tyler Ridder survived the crash. Another passenger, Colby Schmidtke, died from injuries suffered in the accident.

The Sullivan Brothers' Award of Valor is given to peace officers and firefighters who, while serving

in an official capacity, distinguish themselves by the performance of a heroic act in excess of normal demands of police or fire service where the person was fully aware of the threat to his or her personal safety.

## City Council actions

A new sidewalk repair program in Columbus Junction is progressing well and city officials are optimistic the program will continue to win support from local residents.

Officials reviewed the program's progress during the council's regular September 28 meeting. The mandatory plan was approved by the council in August, after a voluntary program failed to generate repairs on

critical sections of the community's sidewalk system.

The new plan set up a priority ranking system for 10 different sidewalk sections in the community. It also maintained a cost-sharing component that was part of the voluntary program. Officials reported at the time the council approved the new plan that property owners along some of those sections had shown an interest in participating.

One of those sections was the number one priority for the plan, the sidewalk south of the school along Colton Street. According to the plan, 2500 feet of sidewalk was proposed for replacement; and council member Mark Huston told the council last week the city's sidewalk construction crew had made good progress on replacing that section. City clerk Julie Heindel said three more projects were ready to go as soon as the current effort is completed. Huston said moving forward with the high priority and visible Colton Street section was ap-

parently paying dividends.

Mayor Dan Wilson agreed and said property owners who might be interested in participating in the program should contact the city. Under the program, owners will pay 50% of the installation cost, but that cost will be lower because city employees construct the walks. Wilson said property owners can arrange to have a cost estimate developed for their section.

In final action, the council agreed to hold Trick or Treat Night on Monday, October 31, from 5:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m.
